Tricks and Treats

The excitement of children and adults at this time of year sometimes makes them forget to be careful. Simple common sense can do a lot to stop many tragedies from happening.

Adults like to have as much fun during Halloween as the kids do! To help keep yourself and others safe, keep an eye on the drinking, don't let it get out of hand. Take the keys away from anyone that may be driving. Have one person stay sober and of-

fer to drive. Know the route your kids will be taking while trick-or-treating if you aren't going with them. Make sure you set a time that they should be home by, and make sure they know how important it is for them to be home on time. Explain to children the difference between tricks and vandalism. Throwing eggs at a house may seem like fun but they need to know the real consequences of their actions. If they are caught

vandalizing, make them pay for and clean up the damage they've caused. Explain to your kids that animal cruelty is not acceptable. Kids may know this on their own but peer pressure can push them to things they wouldn't otherwise do. Make sure that they know that harming animals is not only morally wrong but punishable by law and will not be tolerated.



Over the past 4 years, the Gates Foundation has provided a total of 11 computers to the Library.




The Innocent Man


On Agate Hill

Online Resource of the Month—Interlibrary Loans

The Fort Stockton Public Library can't provide on its shelves every book available—but they can get almost any book you want through a program called Interlibrary Loan. Through this program, you find the book you want online, fill out a short form, and we borrow the book from another library for you. It doesn't cost you anything, and you pick up and drop off the book right at your local public library. So obtaining academic materials, or finishing all 25 books in the series by your favorite author is easier than ever before. To start using this service, go to the library home page at www.fort-stockton.lib.tx.us, then click on "Interlibrary Loan" from the main menu. You'll need your library card, so keep it nearby.

ABOUT COLUMBUS DAY

Christopher Columbus's set sail on August 3, 1492 from Spain with three ships: the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria. At 2 am on October 12, 1492, Rodrigo de Triana, a seaman aboard the Pinta, spotted land. Columbus actually had

landed in the Bahama Islands. The 400th anniversary of the event inspired the first official Columbus Day holiday in the United States. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison issued a proclamation urging Americans to mark the day.

Be EXTRA careful if you are out driving. Excited children can dart out into the street at any time. If you see kids in the act vandalism, or in unsafe situations, and call the police immediately.

For Kids:

Help your child pick out or make a costume that will be safe. Make it fire proof, the eye holes should be large enough for good peripheral vision.

If you set jack-o-lanterns on your porch with candles in them, make sure that they are far enough out of the way so that kids costumes won't accidentally be set on fire.

Make sure that if your child is carrying a prop, such as a scythe, butcher knife or a pitchfork, that the tips are smooth and flexible enough to not cause injury if fallen on.

Treating your kids to a spooky Halloween dinner will make them less likely to eat the candy they collect before you have a chance to check it for them. Teaching your kids basic everyday safety such as not getting into cars or talking to strangers, watching both ways before crossing streets and crossing when the lights tell you to, will help make them safer when they are out Trick or Treating.

It's not as safe to let kids walk the streets alone. Send a responsible adult or older teenager with them.

Take advantage of the many fun, safe, and supervised events planned in the community such as the Halloween Carnival at the school and costume contest/puppet show at the public library.

If the whole community works together, we can keep the children of Fort Stockton and Pecos County safe this Halloween.
